## **Vocational Home Provides Incentive To Youth**

Kiwanis Vocational Homes for Youth is sponsored by the Centralia, Grand Mound, Rochester Kiwanis Clubs with the purpose of teaching survival skills to teenage male youths 15 through 17 years old who have serious home and school adjustment problems. These youths are targeted to learn a trade in such fields as forest management, carpentry, heavy equipment operation, auto repair and maintenance and cooking. Additional vocations such as welding will be offered as the program grows.

There is a recognized need for group care for youths who are normally not acceptable to group homes which require school attendance as a condition of entry. Kiwanis Vocational Homes for Youth has accepted these outof-school youths as they have an ability to learn vocational skills no matter what past problems they have had at school.


A system of graduation has been initiated at the center which has proven to be quite valuable to youths who have for the most part not succeeded at anything.

The boys are issued a blue hard hat when they enter the program.

They are advised that they can moved on to different colored hard hats in keeping with their progress within the home. Youths can move on from the blue hat to a yellow hard hat which represents a probation period during which they strive for crew leader position. This probation period includes freedom from illegal drug use or use of liquor. It incudes efforts to relate well with peers and staff and have successful home leaves

At the end of this probation period, the youth prepares a summary of his accomplishments and sends the summary to a combined Kiwanis board who votes on the youth's acceptability. A graduation is scheduled at a Kiwanis luncheon. The boys accomplishments are read to the Kiwanis community and a white hard hat is presented to the youth. The youth has now been delegated the responsibility of assisting the staff with supervision of his associates in the program, especially during the hours of vocational training. 
